What is a good reader?

Good readers will....


Predict

Ask questions

Clarify (Spot breakdowns and try to mend them) Summarise (put important items together) Infer using clues Make connections to background knowledge Evaluate (identify important words or phrases)



So what are doing in school?



 Uses learning behaviours to support children in conversation.

 Uses reading strategies to support comprehension.







Children should use what they have read and what they know to make predictions on what may happen next.

Example: "I think that the next chapter will be about their journey to the seaside BECAUSE they are putting their bags into the car ready to go.







Checking what something may mean when they do not understand. Children could clarify using pictures in the book, reading over it again, a dictionary, a buddy, an adult, another book or the internet.

> Example: "I'm not sure what technology means, I will use a dictionary to find out"



The reading strategies Asking questions Children should ask question

about what they have read to deepen their understanding.

Example: "why are all the other giants being mean to the BFG?"



Making connections

Children should make connective with the text and themselves. the text and another text they have read.

Example: "I know about tigers because I have seen a TV programme about tigers. The tigers on the TV programme liked to swim too."



Inferring



Children should use clues trom the book to find out something the author hasn't told us.

Example: "I think that the girl will miss her friends because she cried when she said by to them"



The reading strategies Summarising

Children should be able to give a brief description of what they have read.


Example: "This is a book about a family going on holiday to Spain"




The reading strategies <u>Evaluating</u> Children should comment on what they liked and disliked about the book.

Example: "I like the ending to the story because it was not what I was expecting. I didn't like the adjectives the author used as they were a bit boring".

Destination reader bookmark





Use the Destination Reader bookmarks when your child is reading- this will encourage your child to talk about their book more.




Visit the library- it's free!
